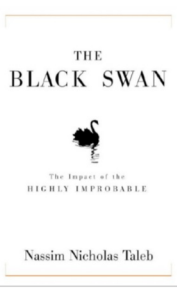

Why antilibrary?

A special concern for mindfully tending to the unread



Read material is ground-like

Unread material is horizon-like

An antilibrary anticipates and primes future intellectual life.

Why digital?

We live (and work) in an age of intensive and expanding digitization.

Digitization changes how texts circulate and how we find and keep them.

If we read at/through more interfaces than paper alone, our antilibraries must undergo a similar transformation.

In digital environments, filtering emerges as the requisite literacy practice.

Filtering is not *only* private and individualistic.



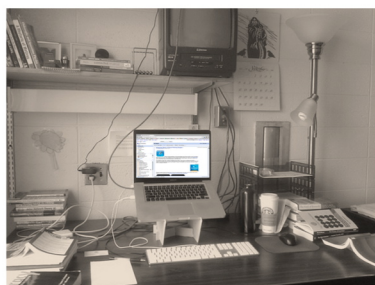
It is also open, shared, and social—*potentially*; if we want it to be, that is.

Google Reader provides a platform to aid us in *filtering* the too-muchness of the web.

It empowers us to create and curate digital antilibraries.
